Learning About Letters

It is important for 3-5 year old children to be familiar with the idea that words are made up of letters. A great way to help children learn the names of a few letters is to teach them to spell and write their own name. Inserting your child's name into the traditional children's song-BINGO— is a perfect way to do this!



"There was a girl who loved to sing and Rosie was her name-o...



Important ways to help your child learn about letters:

- 1. Sing the alphabet song over and over (and slow down for l-m-n-o).
- 2. Help your child notice words that start with the same letter sound.
- 3. Write the alphabet and point to the letters as you sing the alphabet song.
- 4. As your child watches, print his or her name, saying each letter as you write it.
- 5. Help your child learn to write his or her name one step at a time. At first the letters will be written all over the paper and even backwards.
- 6. Point out words and letters all around—on signs, menus, newspapers, etc. For example, "That red sign says stop. S-T-O-P. Can you find another one?"
