FINANCIAL NEWS UPDATES

IRS: 2024 Avg. Refund is Higher Than In 2023

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has released data on 2024 tax filing statistics. Compared to this time during the last filing season, there has been a \$173 increase in the average tax refund, which is currently \$3,145. There has also been an 18% increase in visits to the IRS website. Conversely, the total number of refunds issued decreased by 12.5%. These numbers will continue to be updated as the tax season progresses.

Survey: 47% of Parents Cover Costs for Adult Children



A <u>survey of 1,000 parents</u> with a median age of 56 and have a median earnings between \$50k to \$75k found that 61% of survey respondents feel financially responsible for their adult children. 61% of parents are willing to live more frugally to be able to support their adult children, and 46% are willing to pull money from their savings or retirement accounts.

Furthermore, a small number of the parents surveyed actually set conditions for providing financial support to their adult children. For example, just 45% require their adult children to be employed or actively looking for employment to receive their financial support.

Older Adults Now Work Later in Life

Based on research by Empower, a retirementfocused financial firm, 64% of baby boomers and Gen Xers are open to working indefinitely. 'Personal fulfillment' and 'financial need' are the top reasons for working after retirement followed by 'having a sense of purpose'.

Dating Costs in 2024

A <u>survey of 1,070 U.S. adults</u> shows that many people struggle to fit the costs of dating into their budget. The typical date in 2024 costs each person an average of \$58.84 including costs for food, drinks, clothes, make-up, etc. Despite the costs, 65% stated they believe that " spending more increases the chances of a date being a success." Furthermore, 44% of survey participants stated that whoever earns more should pay for the date while 35% answered that the costs should be split equally.

Home Prices Are 35% More Than Household Incomes

According to a study by Redfin, the typical U.S. household income is far below the amount necessary to purchase a typical U.S. home and meet the Department of Housing and Urban development's standards for housing affordability (30% or less of household income).

In fact, <u>Redfin data</u> shows the typical household income would need to increase by 35% to be able to afford the typical U.S. home. Interest rate

increases combined with lack of housing inventory has led to this imbalance. If mortgage interest rates decrease later this year then this challenge may not continue to be as severe.
